Alabama's oldest and newest cycling organizations have joined forces to introduce a new and challenging ride that will show off the best roads and rural scenery in Madison County. The venerable [Spring City Cycling Club](#) (founded 1892) and the [Alabama Bicycle Coalition](#) (Founded 2004) have teamed up to host a mass start century ride from downtown Huntsville.

In the tradition set by the Three-State/Three-Mountain, Cheaha and Cherochala Centuries, This is a hilly ride featuring 7400 feet of climbing over its 96-mile, undulating course. Each climb is progressively steeper than the last, with the final challenge, Keel Hollow Road, exceeding 18 percent gradient for extended stretches.

The ride is on Saturday, June 18, 2005. It starts at the new Madison County Visitors Bureau located at 500 Church Street at 8 AM. It will be fully supported with rest stops and SAG service. More information is at www.alabike.org/fourhillfeast/.

The Cause: "Safe Routes to School" (SRTS) Cycling and Walking Campaign

Do you remember when kids freely walked or rode their bikes to school? Remember when childhood obesity and diabetes were rare, regrettable conditions? Safe Routes to School is a community-based program to encourage students to bicycle or walk to school. The next Federal Transportation Budget may allocate as much as \$2 million for SRTS in Alabama. Many states currently fund SRTS programs that educate students, school staff, and parents on the personal and community benefits of walking or biking to school.

Funds raised by this event will go towards SRTS program planning. AlaBike is determined that Alabama becomes one of the states that address this transportation, safety, health, and cultural issue. Individual and corporate sponsors are being solicited to help ALDOT bring this important campaign to Alabama in an effective and efficient program.

Dangerous Dog Bill Needs More Bite

Alabama House of Representatives bill HR164, the 'Dangerous Dogs' bill, passed committee in early March. In general, the bill provides a mechanism for dogs to be declared 'dangerous and a significant threat to public health and safety'. If the dog is found by a hearing process to be dangerous, "the dog would be humanely destroyed." The bill also provides for penalties.

While the bill does not mandate funding for enforcement, it defines complaint procedures, penalties, causes for impounding potentially dangerous animals, and actions taken by owners of dangerous animals. From a cyclist's perspective, the bill is a notable start in that it provides a uniform statewide structure for dealing with dangerous animals. On further study of the bill, AlaBike has identified some issues specific to cyclists that should be addressed in the bill. AlaBike President Janie Miernik has been in contact with the bill's sponsor, Representative Cam Ward with the following questions and recommendations.

- (From the Bill) Definition of Attack - Aggressive physical contact initiated by a dog. (This does not define chasing of vehicles and pedestrians as an aggressive behavior. Only physical contact by the animal is officially classified as dangerous behavior. The definition should be broadened to include separate definitions of Attack, Attempted Attack and Aggressive, Unrestrained Behavior.)
- Can the definition of dangerous behavior be broadened to include chasing of vehicles (including bicycles) and pedestrians?
- Do all counties have "leash" or animal containment laws? How could the dangerous dog law apply in a county without leash laws?
- Can a uniform leash law or containment requirement be added to the bill?
- Can animals roaming off the owner's property be considered potentially dangerous behavior?

The problem for cyclists is that otherwise non-dangerous dogs that are loose often instinctively and aggressively chase bikes. While often not biting the rider, their speed and momentum carry them into the path of the cyclist, into the bike itself, into the path of oncoming traffic, or scare the cyclist into an unstable state on the bike.

In principle, AlaBike generally supports HR164, but recommends modification to strengthen the law to include broader definitions for 'Attack', 'Attempted Attack', and 'Aggressive Unrestrained Behavior'.

AlaBike Goes to Montgomery and Washington DC

In early March, AlaBike members Dave Stone and Jamie Miernik made an effort to contact officials and legislators in Montgomery. We expressed our desire to meet our representatives to discuss cycling and especially safety issues. Mike Ball, representative for the north Alabama Huntsville area, knows a lot of folks at Public Safety because he used to be a trooper and worked in Public safety for 20 years. He made a few phone calls and provided an inside track for communication in two important areas: accident reporting and officer training. We have submitted an

training program developed by MassBike to educate officers about cycling related traffic issues. We also have developed positive communication with Dr. Brown of UA Tuscaloosa, who crunches accident data and posts it to a Public Safety website.

We're still trying to convince The Driver's License Division to make some changes to the AL Driver's Manual. We provided revisions but they were rejected, so far...

March 17, several board members again visited Washington DC for the Nat'l Bike Summit for the third year in a row. We spoke to members of staff of all of the AL Congressmen on behalf AlaBike and cyclists.

The Shoals Environmental Alliance, a smart growth and green space advocacy group based in Florence, is sponsoring a number of Earth Day events at the Tennessee Valley Authority's Muscle Shoals Reservation at Wilson Dam on Saturday April 23.

11th Annual BAMA Bike Tour Starts in June

The 11th annual **BikeBama** bicycle tour runs June 4-11, 2005. The ride starts and ends at Battleship Park, in Mobile. The ride covers about 350 miles in one week, with some longer rides for those wishing to get in a century. There will be time to explore the Gulf Coast. The route proceeds west to Bayou LeBatre, (think seafood) then to Fort Morgan via the Dauphin Island Ferry, Fairhope, an early utopian community, Bay Minette, the seat of Baldwin County. There will be SAG support, and daily rest stops. Basic overnight accommodations are at city, state, and private parks (camping), but every stop has nearby motels and places to eat (we "live off the land"). Not every day's ride will require breaking camp.

The theme this year is "Get back in the saddle again". Most Alabamians rode bikes as children, but somehow around the age of 16 we lost the wonder, the freedom, the exhilaration, the mobility of biking. This year BAMA is flat, and the days are generally short, just right for a first-time adult cyclo-tourist or children. The Elevator Speech – Don't get caught with your pants down



Someday, somewhere, someone is going to ask you about AlaBike. The questions could go something like this: "So, what's this AlaBike thing all about?" This is a critical moment. How do you explain the reason for the existence of a bicycle advocacy organization in a way that does not lose your audience? The next few seconds are your chance to get out the message and possibly win a new member, a donor or the favor of a local politician.

First, let's face some cold, hard realities here. For cyclists and non-cyclists, advocacy can be deadly boring. The language of bicycle advocacy is filled with jargon and buzzwords that only hold meaning to other advocates. Words like "inclusion", "multi-modal", and "connectivity" will glaze the eyes of even the most dedicated and enthusiastic bike advocate. Realizing this potential pitfall of getting the message out, we have come up with the Elevator Speech.

The Elevator Speech is thus named after the average time of an elevator ride. If, for instance, you get into an elevator with your city's mayor, this short speech will outline the major points, purpose and goals of AlaBike in the 30 or so seconds you have useful attention span this person has to give to your cause.

In actuality, memorizing such a speech could add to the dullness factor. We've created not so much a speech to memorize from rote, but a series of short

points you can connect in any way you wish.

Without further ado, here are your AlaBike Elevator Speech Talking Points:

For Cyclists –

- We are doing things for you, the cyclist. We work for safe roads for everyone.
- We are becoming a statewide organization that connects cyclists.
- We advocate, driver and cyclist education and acceptance.

For Non-Cyclists –

- We are making the roads safer for kids, non-drivers, and the elderly. The population consists of a large number of these people who do not drive.
- Economic incentive – A high quality of life is economically attractive. The small investment in user-friendly roads has big returns.
- Safe roads benefit everyone

While not encompassing all things AlaBike, these five bullets can be used as conversation starters to give the broadest outline of AlaBike's mission.

Useful Information: Get to Know Your Local MPO

Every major municipality in Alabama has a local Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) and Citizen's Advisory Committee (CAC). The MPOs are charged with coordinating the planning, engineering and execution of transportation development projects in the larger metro areas. It is a goal of AlaBike to put a member cyclist on every CAC and/or specific Bicycle/Pedestrian Committee is AL to review plans and proposals for bike/ped accommodation.

The following lists the MPOs points of contact and bike plan-related information of all of the MPOs in the state of Alabama. AlaBike advocates are encouraged to participate and get involved with their local MPO or CAC. Your MPO is practically where the "rubber meets the road" for local planning projects.
